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## MEDICAL RESPONSE TO TERRORISM TO BE THEME OF NOVEMBER DDP MEETING IN LOS ANGELES

Suppose that a 2 kiloton "satchel" nuclear bomb exploded atop a ten story building in New York. Death, destruction, and agony could reach out for a mile or more. The DDP annual seminar will address prevention and the role of medical response.

Although nuclear terrorism is a possibility, chemical and biological weapons are far more accessible to terrorists. In addition, US intelligence analysts suspect that Soviet SS-19 missiles have been equipped with chem-bio warheads, which have a blunter shape, are less accurate, and do not spin on entering the atmosphere as nuclear warheads do. DDP panelists will discuss the potential types of weapons and methods for defense.

The annual seminar will be held at the Los Angeles Airport Hyatt, Nov. 2 and 3. The cost is \$75, or \$100 if paid after Oct. 21. Write to DDP, PO Box 1057, Starke, FL 32091.

Other distinguished speakers include Nobel laureate Eugene Wigner; Reed Irvine of Accuracy in Media, producer of "Television's Vietnam: the Real Story"; earthquake specialist Hal Bernson; and reporter Charles Wiley, veteran of eight arrests by the KGB and other secret police agencies. # VOLCANOES IN A COALFIELD: A NUCLEAR WINTER SIMULATION?

Every hundred thousand years or so, a coalfield hosts a volcanic eruption, spewing into the atmosphere from 250 to 2500 cubic kilometers of incandescent tephra. The soot and energy inputs from these natural evisceratiions of the earth dwarf those of the "nuclear winter" scenario. The fuel loading in a coalfield is from 100 to 10,000 gm/sq cm, rather than the 1 to 50 gm/sq cm in rural or urban fires. Applied to these volcanic phenomena, the nuclear winter model would predict climatic catastrophe every 10 million years or so. But as it happens, life is not yet extinct.

The conclusions of Russell Seitz of the American Security Council Foundation cannot be stated more elegantly: "It remains to be seen whether the neologism 'nuclear winter' will ever qualify as what philosophers of language call a 'rigid designator in the real set', two examples of which are 'Carbon County, Wyoming' and 'The Yellowstone Caldera'. I do not mean to consign 'the nuclear winter' to the null set, exemplified by 'the canals of Mars' and 'the unicorn', but merely to point out that a fossil rhinoceros in the hand is more amenable to analysis than two unicorns in the software."

## DDP POSITION MISREPRESENTED IN AMA JOURNAL

The August 2 issue of <u>JAMA</u> devotes nearly half a column to DDP, most of it inaccurate. Day and Waitzkin state that "spokespersons for DDP have argued for a continuing nuclear arms buildup and have advocated medical participation in planning for nuclear war. . . . DDPs media successes have tended to counteract the opposition of PSR and other peace groups to civil defense preparations" (p. 649).

Since DDP does <u>not</u> take a stand on weapons proposals, Waitzkin (author of "The Marxist View of Medical Care," <u>Annals of Internal Medicine</u> 89:264, 1978) was not able to quote a reference to support his assertion. He uses the disingenuous device of implicitly equating a plot to start a nuclear war with preparations for the eventuality.

DDP <u>does</u> interpret the Hippocratic Oath to mean that "it is a moral imperative to save lives and prevent suffering in <u>any</u> type of disaster," according to former DDP President Howard Maccabee. However, that pledge is unfavorably compared, again in <u>JAMA</u>, with the oath signed by Soviet physicians, which calls for much greater social responsibility.

The same issue of <u>JAMA</u> reviews the history of civil defense in a biased, negativistic manner, in studies funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Rockefeller Foundation. Although it is implied that opposition to civil defense is an viewpoint held by the majority of AMA members, this seems unlikely. Physicians belonging to the AMA might share their reaction with George Lundberg, Editor of <u>JAMA</u>, and James Sammons, Executive Director of the AMA, 535 N.
